Speaker: John Sherwood Bobbitt Auditorium, Albion College - 10:00 a.m.

<u>Subject</u>: "<u>The Adam Crosswhite Incident</u>: its local connection and impact on legislation that further fractured the states in the lead-up to America's Civil War."

"The Crosswhite Incident" is legendary in Marshall, MI for having been a moment when the abolitionist cause stirred a state's-rights controversy between Michigan and Kentucky in the late 1840s. It is part of the best-documented case of a slave family escaping together and enduring a series of travails until freedom in Canada and, eventually, the United States. John Sherwood is the author of a "Michigan History" article on the subject as well as the compiler of "The Crosswhite Compendi-



um," available for researchers in the Marshall and Battle Creek public libraries.

John is a Marshall native, a graduate of Marshall High School, Albion College ('72) and Western Michigan University. A life-long journalist, he has worked primarily with the Gannett Co. newspapers in Battle Creek, Port Huron and Wilmington, Delaware. Sherwood also served as a public-relations specialist for Oaklawn Hospital in Marshall for two years. As a free-lance writer, he has traveled frequently to the United Kingdom researching the basis for his creation of mystery-weekend events for the Victorian Villa Inn in Union City.

# **AALL Course Descriptions, Winter, 2015**

#### Registration required

<u>EASTERN EUROPE SINCE THE FALL OF THE BERLIN WALL</u>. Patrick McLean, MA, Political Science, Continuing Studies from Freie Universität, Berlin, Director Ford Institute, Albion College. Mondays, 2:00-4:00, January 19, 26, February 3, 10. TBA. <u>Note</u>: Deadline for Registration is January 9

This course will explore the varied paths taken by the states of the former Eastern Bloc since 1989. The first class will include a brief history of the region under Communism in order to understand the events after the Berlin Wall fell. We will also cover the dramatic events that led up to the actual dismantling of the wall in November, 1989.

The second week will include a discussion of key social and political events during the post-Communist era, including German reunification, the movement toward the West through membership in NATO and the European Union, the Balkan wars, and some of the areas where different countries' paths diverge.

The third week will focus in a more detailed way on socio-political situations in a few countries such as Poland, the former Czechoslovakia, Hungary, and one or two countries of interest to participants in this course.

We will conclude with a discussion of the current state of Eastern Europe, including relations with the West and with Russia. The situation in the Ukraine will be included in the discussion, particularly as it affects the rest of the region. Finally, we will conclude with a discussion of the travel opportunities in the region with an emphasis on some of the great cities including Prague, Budapest, and Berlin.

<u>EVOLVING KNOWLEDGE ABOUT FOOD.</u> Trisha Franzen, PhD., Professor, Women's and Gender Studies, Albion College and Barbara Lange, M.A., Retired Home Economics Educator. Mondays, 10:00-12:00. February 2, 9, 16, 23. <u>Note</u>: \$5.00 fee. Class size limit: 20 persons. (Registration deadline January 22)

The first two sessions of the course, taught by Trisha Franzen, will 1) outline briefly the history and cultural meaning of food, and 2) introduce you to the burgeoning field of food studies that offer new approaches such as scientific, historic, and economic analyses of food. Among the questions we'll consider are what we can learn from traditional diets; why our modern diets influence the human microbiome; how globalization has changed (and continues to change) what we choose to eat; and finally, what all this has to do with homemade sauerkraut.

Sessions three and four, offered by Barbara Lange, will expand understanding of key pieces of consumer information published by the USDA. We will explore the historical context of consumer protections in the food industry and discuss the benefits and limitations of government regulations. We will analyze Nutrition Facts Labels, Ingredient Panels, Content Claims, My Plate Guidelines, and Food Safety Rules in order to increase their usefulness as tools for making food decisions. In addition we will find out about an online diet analysis program and, finally, participate in a cooking project.

SHAKESPEARE IN MUSIC. Rob Reed. Wednesdays, 2:00-4:00. February 04, 11, 18, 25. Reed Home, 414 Allen Place, Albion. Class size limit: 30 persons. (Registration deadline January 22)

In 1598, Francis Meres praised "the mellifluous and honey-tongue'd Shakespeare." The world agrees. Shakespeare eventually gave us sonnets, extended poems, and 37 plays that read as music. From Master "Jack" Wilson, composer and actor at Shakespeare's Globe, through the next 400 years, thousands of musicians have been inspired to capture the Bard's wit and melancholy. The greatest have channeled Shakespeare. This course will look at the hits and a few misses of music inspired by the unique body of work that stirs every imaginative soul. Hector Berlioz mused, "Next to God, it is Shakespeare who has created most."

THE RACE FOR STOCKHOLM. Vanessa McCaffrey, Ph.D., Associate Professor, Chemistry, Albion College. Tuesdays, 2:00-4:00. February 3, 10, 17, 24. TBA. (Registration deadline January 22).

What is the Nobel Prize? Given every October, the Nobel Prize celebrates and recognizes monumental achievements in medicine, physics, chemistry, literature, and peace. Established by Alfred Nobel's will in 1895, the prizes are widely regarded as the most prestigious award that a person can win. In this class, we will look at some of the Nobel Prizes given in the sciences. The first topic of discussion will be Alfred Nobel. We will read his will and try to understand the motivation behind the establishment of the prizes. In the subsequent weeks, we will look at each of the science prizes in turn (chemistry, physics, and medicine) and learn about some of the more important prizes awarded in each of the areas. Controversies surrounding specific prizes will also be discussed. Participants should have access to a computer and the internet, as some of the class material will be distributed as (.pdf) files. The Nobel Prize website (www.nobelprize.org) will also be used for some material.


- 1. Fill in the blank below (on the left) for yourself. If you have a spouse/partner who is an AALL member, use the blank (on the right).

### **AALL Lottery Policy for Over-Enrolled Classes**

When a course with limits is over-enrolled, the names of all of those who had it listed as #1 shall be entered in a lottery. Those randomly drawn shall be placed in the class. Those not selected will comprise the waiting list and also be given first access if that course is offered again. The registrar will keep a record of those on the waiting list until the course is offered again.

Those selected for the course in its first offering will not be eligible to retake it until all those on the waiting list have had the opportunity to take the course.

Those who have signed up for a class with limits and listed it as #1 are encouraged to sign up for at least one additional class. Members are also encouraged not to sign up for a course with limited enrollment if they know they won't be there for all four sessions.

Registrants for all classes will receive a letter shortly after January 25, 2015 that will acknowledge their registration, and provide additional information about the course(s) for which they have registered.

If you are unable to attend a course for which you have registered, fees will be refunded ONLY if the AALL Registrar, Mary Deardurff (517-629-9661) is notified no later than one week prior to the start of the class.

<u>PLEASE NOTE</u>: AALL incorporated as a separate NONPROFIT organization in January 2010 under the incorporation laws of the State of Michigan. However, we have NOT yet become a TAX EXEMPT organization under the provisions of the Internal Revenue Service. Therefore, any donations and/or fees paid to AALL are NOT tax deductible. The AALL Board is currently weighing the costs and benefits of applying for tax-exempt status, but no decision has yet been reached.
