She will share surprising insights from her latest book about white Union soldiers' racial attitudes during the Civil War.

Winter Assembly – Thursday, January 9, 2020, 10:00 a.m.

"There is Nothing Like Having a Slave": White Union Soldiers' Attitudes about Race during the American Civil War Marcy Sacks, Ph.D.

Julian S. Rammelkamp Professor of History, Albion College

When northern white men went to war during the 1860s to fight for the Union, they took with them their prejudices and ignorance about African Americans. As they encountered black people, a remarkable number of these soldiers developed fantasies about becoming slave owners themselves. In this presentation for AALL, I will discuss the evolution of whites' racial attitudes, specifically their growing desire for slave ownership. Allowing participants to examine soldiers' letters, diaries, and staged photographs, we will explore how their interactions with black people cultivated among whites a desire to have dominion over another human being, even as they denounced southern Confederates for doing precisely that. The mythologies they created about themselves allowed them to imagine genuinely paternalistic relationships with "their" servants (their letters are replete with proprietary language) at the same time that they scoffed at southern whites for believing that enslaved people welcomed their bondage. These fantasies hampered black people's efforts to be recognized as fully free or equal citizens. Marcy Sacks earned her Ph.D. in U.S. History at the University of California at Berkeley. She has been teaching history at Albion College for over 20 years. She has written two books, Before Harlem: The Black Experience in New York City before World War I, and Joe Louis: Race and Sports in Twentieth-Century America. She is now at work on a third book about white Union soldiers' racial attitudes during the Civil War.

When she is not teaching or researching, Marcy can usually be found running somewhere.

AMERICAN PHARMA: THE SCIENCE AND THE BUSINESS BEHIND YOUR DRUGS

Craig Streu, Associate Professor of Chemistry, Albion College. Thursdays. 10:00 am. – 12:00 noon. Location TBD.

Pharmaceuticals are big business in America. Global trade treaties, the stock market, and most importantly, our health, rely on developments in this rapidly evolving industry. How does it work and why should we all care? This course will examine the types of pharmaceuticals, how each works, and how they are discovered, developed, marketed and ultimately brought to market. The course will have a distinct focus on the science behind drugs, but it is impossible to separate the science of drug discovery from the business of drug sales, and so the course will often and unavoidably diverge into topics of ethics, marketing and economics.

Topics include the following: how drugs work at the molecular level, what makes a 'good' drug, chemical and other strategies for discovering new drugs, the drug development process and timeline, FDA approval process, drug naming and marketing, intellectual property/patent issues, generic vs. name brand drugs, and drug wholesalers and sales.

THE GOLDEN AGE OF MUSICAL PERFORMANCE

Why do the performances of the great performers who were active on the stage in the early decades of the 20th century stand out so vividly when compared to those of today? What makes the sound of Fritz Kreisler or John McCormack so identifiable after only a few seconds? What is it in their playing that gives each of these artists such a unique and special identity? We will devote time in these four classes to listening and discussing the great planists, instrumentalists, singers and chamber ensembles in an effort to see what made these artists so unique and of course beloved to audiences around the world. Many historical audio and some video recordings will be used both to capture and illustrate their unique artistry.

UNKNOWN AUSTRIA HIDDEN IN THE HEART OF EUROPE

Austria, a country located in the heart of Europe, is barely known by most Americans. If Americans do know something of Austria, it's often from The Sound of Music, a 54-year-old film that, surprisingly for Americans, many Austrians have never seen.

With a population of 9 million, Austria has roughly the same number of people as Michigan in an area one-third as large. About 2 million Austrians live in Vienna, the capital, with the remainder scattered across eight other states (or "Laender"). Those Americans who have visited Austria have mostly visited Vienna and Salzburg, the home of the Family von Trapp from The Sound of Music and, more important to Austrians, the birthplace of Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart. But there is much beyond the tourist meccas of the capital and Salzburg.

This four-week course aims to go well beyond the Hollywood version of this spectacularly beautiful country to explore the post war history and politics of Austria, the geography that makes it a fabulous travel destination, and the social and political climate that is moving in a direction similar to its eastern neighbors. The course will also examine the outsized role Austria has played in international diplomacy since WWII. Finally, we will spend some time on the classical music traditions of Austria, home of Mozart, Mahler, Schubert and Strauss, as well as its tremendous art history.

Course Registration Form Instructions

For each course for which you wish to register, place a number in the box in front of the course name: 1 for the course you most wish to take, 2 for the second course you wish to take, etc. (NOTE: If you only wish to take one course, mark it with the number 1—see instruction 3 below.

In the column marked FEE, indicate the appropriate cost. Your first course (each term) is free with your AALL membership; simply write FREE in the FEE column. For each additional course, the fee is \$10.

If you wish to indicate an alternate choice (in case one of your choices above is oversubscribed and you are not admitted to that course), mark an X in the box before your alternate choice.

If there are additional class fees for supplies, these fees need to be paid at the time of registration. If you are unable to attend a course for which you have registered, fees can be refunded up until the start of the course.

Policy for over-enrolled classes

When a course with limits is over-enrolled, the names of all those who had it listed as #1 shall be entered in a lottery. Those randomly drawn shall be placed in the class. Those not selected will comprise the waiting list and also be given first access if that course is offered again. The Registrar will keep a record of those on the waiting list until the course is offered again. Those selected for the course in its first offering will not be eligible to retake it until all those on the waiting list have had the opportunity to take the course. Those who have signed up for a class with limits and listed it as #1 are encouraged to sign up for at least one additional class. Members are also encouraged not to sign up for a course with limited enrollment if they know they won't be there for all four sessions.
